Some of our troops are packing for the grand US tour as I type and I know that they will each relate to most, if not all of those sentiments!


Bon Voyage, Guys. Have a great trip, bring back loads of memories, be safe and enjoy - but hurry home!



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

## First Ride Motor Guzzi Californian 1400 Custom

Saturday morning arrived cool, sunny, great for bikes. Decision time! Meet up with the Fremantle Saturday E Shed coffee guys or test ride another different bike. Some days you have to make tough decisions. So off to Causeway Victory dealer to test a Victory Cross country tour. Cross country tour as a plan cross country has to be brought without a test ride as they only bring in the Cross Country tour for tests.

When I arrived at Victory Causeway out in front was a new Guzzi 1400 custom. It stood gleaming in silver with those massive cylinders and heads protruding out from under the fuel tank. Closer inspection revealed gas reservoirs for the rear shocks, cali tourers have different rear shocks, different bars, windscreen seat and trim, other than that a similar ride. The thought of test riding the Victory went out the window, so after talking to the salesman a ride was organized. First I had to wait for the dealers plate to arrive, which was duly attached to the bike.

Having never ridden the older Californians or even a Guzzi before, I was somewhat surprised when I fired it up and EVERYTHING shook. However when it was revved it all settled down and was smooth.

After a brief rundown on the various controls and a warning that the tyres were new (4 kms) I eased out the clutch (single dry plate) and I was on my way. Threading my way through traffic to get to the Poly pipe I realised that the balance at low speed was great, feet up slow turns, no probs.

Entering the 80 km the legendary pull of the V twin was soon apparent, even with a new motor it was quickly through its gears and I was soon in  $6^{th}$  I think. Push down yep  $6^{th}$ . This bike likes to be above 3000 rpm. Torque starts at 2,700 rpm.

After leaving the Poly pipe, decision time, north or south, north won. Rats 60 km speed restrictions, should have gone south. Have not been north for a while. Finally 100 km limit, time to go. Gearbox very light to change, soon sitting on 100 km 6<sup>th</sup> gear, 3,100 revs, slow cars, squirt, gone, 6<sup>th</sup> pulls and feels like to 5<sup>th</sup> gear. Bike is smooth with all the vibes gone, suspension smooth, road reflectors hardly felt, wind flow smooth over the full face Shoei

All too soon I was approaching Erindale Road turnoff, back through the gears, brake, dam lever set too low have to roll off the throttle to reach, brakes good, rear independent from front, both ABS, Brembo.

Arrive back at the dealers, exhaust pipes have a wisp of smoke from burn in, engine at idle with a mechanical sound to be heard from the single overhead cam, 4 valve heads, Guzzi A typical I am told.

A new punter and salesman waiting for my return with "where the hell have you been?" from the next eager rider, 36 km there and back I tell him and then he is gone.

Summing up – (after a short straight line ride)

The bike has the feel of a sportsbike to me, albeit without the power of one.

It needs revs to be comfortable, redline at 7000 rpm

It will change other cruisers because what it offers is not on other crusiers

- 3 stage engine mapping Veloce performance

  Turisimo touring

  Pioggio rain
- 2. Traction control, 3 stage selectable.
- 3. LED daytime running lights

Xenon low/high beam.

Test ride one, I am sure you like me will find it a good ride, different, but from what I have been able to find out, thoroughly heart and soul a Moto Guzzi.

# STICK E BEAK HAS A WAFFLE ABOUT CORNER MARKING

Over the last couple of years there has been a pretty significant change in membership at the Fremantle Branch. This is great however a side show of this is beginning to show up on rides. We seem to have a number of breakdowns in the corner marking system.

The system has been in use in Ulysses for many years and works well in the main. It is certainly the best we can come up with. This uses the principle that the rider following behind the Ride Leader stops and marks the corner before the corner. The marker is then required to remain there until the "Tail End Charlie" (TEC) arrives.

The last bit is the most important. The most important person on the ride is the TEC as once he/she arrives at a corner it means that all the riders are safe and have passed that check point. Essentially the corner marker, as well as directing the ride direction, acts as a check point ensuring the welfare of all the riders including the TEC.

The ride will fall apart if the corner is vacated before TEC arrives as there will be riders at the end of the ride who do not where to go. The most important thing is that the TEC will become separated from the ride and corner markers further on will be staying at their corners until the non arriving TEC does not appear!

The message is loud and clear......


## Stay at the corner until TEC arrives.
