



## Tommy Can You Hear Me? NO! Ear Protection - The Sound Investment For Riders

It's not hard in this country to lose your hearing. In the 60s everyone blamed it on the Vietnam war. I had two brothers there and indeed they lost a substantial amount of hearing while in the service. I however was younger and missed the draft - but not the ability to lose over half my

hearing. Playing in bands and attending an average of two concerts a week during my 20s did irreparable damage to my ears and audiologists want to put me in the Smithsonian when I die because many of my symptoms amaze them.

I have perfect pitch, but actually hear notes differently depending on which ear they are entering. Due to a correctional ability in my brain it all works out as long as I can hear the note coming into each ear. My brain also recreates lost frequencies in music as long as it has enough to go on either side of the range. But, when it comes to the human voice this is surely not the case.

Then there's the traffic differential. The frequency that traffic din is at is one that I hear well. The frequency range of the human voice is another story as I only hear it half as well. Which basically means my brain processes traffic at twice the level of sound as I hear the human voice! And what about high pitched sounds like birds? Forget it. Luckily I can still see them and as I age they become more interesting to me, but only visually unfortunately. Basically my hearing is pretty screwed up and I live with the handicap for which there is no cure and no insurance coverage.

If you're riding a motorcycle and not protecting your ears with proper plugs you'll be on the road to my world in no time. Constant wind turbulence around your helmet and the general flow of traffic is enough to get you started. If you've ever driven through the Graham Farmer Freeway tunnel at peak hour with a half helmet on, you are asking for real trouble. The sound level in those spots is so loud it's one that can easily tilt your equilibrium and potentially cause you to lose balance along with a percentage of hearing.

Rule of the thumb is that anything over 65 decibels for more than just a couple of minutes will begin to tear away at your hearing ability. Many Australians have already had plenty of this battering and many are already 25% deaf or better just from everyday life in the city.

The solution is simple. No matter how much hearing you have left, beam yourself over to the nearest drug store and invest in a few sets of plugs. Three bucks gets you about 25 pair when you buy them in bulk. Use them each time you ride and you'll be doing yourself a great service. Go through my handbag and riding jacket

There is no law against using ear protection when operating a motor vehicle. The fact is, once you put your plugs in, you will be able to hear most of the same sounds you would hear if you were driving a car with the windows rolled up. Your visual perception will be stronger because your senses won't be processing so much audio information. It's really quite a treat once you get your plugs in and start riding and you will no doubt be able to ride longer because you'll be less tired mentally. I call it tune out and turn on.

Here's a little etiquette for when you're riding with someone else. Speaking to each other with helmets and earplugs on offers you little or no chance to get your point across. If you need to speak to other person about something important set up a hand signal system for requesting a stop. Once you stop, get your helmets off, your plugs out and then speak. Of coarse you'll try communicating with the plugs in and the helmets on and I'll be sitting across the street watching your

frustration, but I won't hear a thing. TM/July 99






Horsham to the Grampians posted 8 Nov 2012



I was heading towards Port Augusta today but I've lost a bit of time weathering the storms the last two days and don't think I would have had enough time to get there before dusk.

After speaking to a couple at Penong who mentioned they were going thru to Streaky Bay, I change my route and decided that sounded nice. So glad I did as Streaky Bay is lovely and peaceful. My campsite is right on the beach with one of the best views. Not bad for \$24 a night.

#### One week to go posted 23 Oct 2012

With one week to go, the days are just flying by. The Tiger is off to JCS Motorcycles tomorrow for a pre-trip service. He is also getting a rear tyre fitted and new chain & sprockets, just to be sure. Today I received a new throttle lock which should work a treat on the Nullarbor. It's a 'Go Cruise' which seems to be very simple in design and has been highly recommended.

I'm taking the Android tablet to post my daily blogs & keep in touch with family & friends. My Sony Action Camera will be mounted on my helmet along the more interesting roads & tracks so hopefully I will be able to post up a video or two. My tent is a MSR Hubba Hubba, mattress is an Exped which is the best camping mattress I have ever slept on and of course I have a Jetboil to keep up the daily coffee intake. All in all I'm pretty well organised and the packing is just about done apart from those last minute things.

#### How it all started posted 21 Oct 2012

After many sleepless nights and coming to terms that owning a Dressage horse was getting too expensive, I had to look for a new hobby. One that would give me the satisfaction of achieving personal goals, one that makes me feel great to be alive and of course one that could provide the odd adrenaline rush. And, a hobby with horsepower.

So I turned to Motorbikes.

My first motorcycle lesson was a week after I sold my horse. I figured if I didn't like it I would try something else. I had ridden the odd mini bike & quad bike when I was a kid but that was many moons ago. I still remember the fun we had and how exhilarated I would feel after a ride.

I bought a Suzuki Intruder 250cc cruiser while I was still having lessons. It was only 8 weeks before I was out on the road with my licence. I kept the bike for 7 weeks and realised I needed something bigger to accommodate my longer legs. That thing nearly crippled me.



After sitting on the Triumph Tiger 800 in the dealership showroom, I went home to figure out a way how I could have that bike. One week later, he was mine.



In the first year of owning the Tiger, I have clocked up 47,500 kms and loved every minute. I have perfected the bike weekend camping trip, been on a Numbat Bike Rally, two Ulysses Rallies and have also done a week-long trip up thru the Gascoyne to Mt Augustus, 2,700kms mainly on gravel, with 2 other Tiger riders. Had a blast of a time I must say.



Which brings me to the start of this blog. I am about to embark on a month long solo adventure across Australia, from Perth to Victoria. Planning to travel across the Nullarbor to Mildura, onto the Victorian Highlands, up to Mt Kosciuzsko, down thru the Snowy Mountains, Melbourne, The Otways, the Grampians, up thru Adelaide, on to the Flinders Ranges and back across the Nullarbor. All up about 12,000kms.

The plan is to camp along the way in National Parks & Caravan Parks. I hope to fit in lots of walks, climb a few mountains and enjoy a trip up the Murray River on a Paddle Steamer. Main objective is too enjoy that sense of freedom even if it is just for 30 days.

#### THE UCARF STORY

Ulyssians have always been generous people and right from the start have opened their hearts to worthy causes. At the Wagga AGM in 1997 it was decided that in the absence of a specific alternative, the Ulysses Club would designate research into arthritis as its own preferred charity. The impetus for the choice came from the death at only 72 the previous year of Jo Dearnley who finally lost a 20-year battle against rheumatoid arthritis. Because arthritis is so slow, insidious, painful and debilitating it does not attract the same publicity as the more obvious and 'dramatic' diseases, yet not only is it by far the most common cause of painful and severe handicap in this country, it can also be deadly. In its various forms it affects nearly five million Australians and accounts for more deaths than AIDS or MS, yet because the disease is so diffuse it does not attract a lot of media attention.

In the beginning with funds were passed to the Arthritis Foundation but after some internal problems and the discovery that only a minute portion was directed to research, it was decided that the Ulysses Club would channel donations directly to the front line. Consequently the club has given significant support to a number of post-graduate students in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne and supplied their laboratories with expensive items of equipment. As the Ulysses Club Arthritis Fund we have had progress reports from the researchers themselves and direct evidence of where our contributions are being applied.

For 2011 NatCom has agreed to take this a step further by offering a full fellowship to a brilliant research scientist, Kelly McKelvie, from Otago University in Dunedin. This calls for UCARF to commit \$80,000 over the next twelve months and in return Kelly will be providing the Club with regular progress reports and updates. I hope members will have the opportunity meeting her personally at the Newcastle AGM in March. With research now moving to the forefront of genetic and molecular biology I would like to feel that the Ulysses Club was taking a lead in unlocking the secret of auto-immune diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis; in looking for a cure, not just another palliative measure.
