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

First test: Harley-Davidson Livewire

When Harley-Davidson's LiveWire electric motorcycle was revealed in June (*AMCN* Vol63 No25), some wrote the concept motorcycle off as little more than a publicity exercise to promote Marvel's latest Avengers movie. But after becoming one of just a handful of journalists to test ride the new machine, I can confirm the electric naked sportster is not a fluffy concept designed to do the show circuit: it's a serious production-exercise.

The first thing which strikes you about the LiveWire is its size. The H-D design team has done a fantastic job with the bike's styling and proportions, making it appear as big as a V-Rod in the official studio photographs. In reality, the LiveWire is about the size of a café racer - but it's a strikingly attractive café racer.

There's also more than one LiveWire. While Harley-Davidson will not confirm exactly how many of the hand-built machines are in existence, estimates put the figure at around 25. The two LiveWires I was allowed to study in detail, poke, prod and ride were finished off as well as any quality-built production motorcycle.

Speaking with members of the LiveWire team, it's obvious the company's future contains battery power as well as pistons and conrods. While they are quick to shut-down any questioning about when an electric Harley-Davidson will become showroom stock, they are happy to say when instead of if - as they describe the differences between the LiveWire concept and the eventual production model.

While not being given the electric fob to the LiveWire for as long as I would have liked, my trip to the USA coincided with the Labour Day long-weekend, meaning the streets around the Californian industrial area were almost deserted, allowing me to enjoy a bit of spirited riding.

Even with LiveWire's minders requesting the mapping remain in economy mode, the LiveWire had enough sting in the tail the accelerate to 100km/h in around 5.5 second. I was told this figure is dramatically cut in sport mode. We were told the top speed is around 150km/h, but the LiveWire didn't take too much coaxing to reach 135km/h along one of the short straights.


Unlike other electric motorcycles I've ridden, the LiveWire feels and handles like a proper motorcycle - nothing feels cheap or light. The suspension is firm but comfortable, soaking up smaller bumps in the road surface, and the brakes provide a superbike-bite. The great handling characteristic make you wonder where they managed to hide the bike's 210kg-plus weight. Within minutes you feel comfortable and confident on the LiveWire. Its drop-down handlebar, rear-set foot pegs and single-racer style seat allow you to cradle the machine and simply flick it into a corner and power out the other side.

As soon as consumers can rid themselves of the electric vehicle range anxiety which has been plaguing the industry since its inception, and governments start to back electric vehicles as viable alternative the petrol and diesel powered machines, motorcycles like the LiveWire will be ready to hit the market running.
