Remember— It's not what you ride, it's your attitude that counts.



The following article has kindly been written by Tony Collins in reference to the recent trip by a group of Ulyssians to Vietnam. The story will be presented in three parts in three Wheezies starting with this edition. Thanks Tony

Vietnam Ride with Platypus Foundation Nov Dec 2016

Part ONE

We arrived to the chaos that is Hanoi on 18th November and were immediately visually overwhelmed by the teeming mass of people and vehicles. We stayed in the Quoc Hoa Hotel which was clean, comfortable, cheap (US\$40 per night) and well located in the French Quarter to allow exploration of the old city on foot.

Hanoi has a population of 9 million people and over 7 million scooters and small motorbikes – at times it felt like they were all on the road at the same time. The majority of scooters are Honda and Yamaha 110 to 150cc - being light and nimble they are the ideal vehicle to manoeuvre through the mass of vehicles on the road.

Two wheeled vehicles are everywhere with some carrying impossible loads and the road rules are obviously there just to give someone a job of writing them because no rider or driver obeys them. Very few roads in the old French Quarter of Hanoi have white lines and a large proportion of intersections do not have traffic control signs – this turns out to be a very sensible cost saving exercise because no one would take the slightest bit of notice of any of them. Crossing the road on foot is like taking a leap of faith – you make a decision to cross, quick check and then cross - do not vary your pace or stop and amazingly all of the vehicles go around you. Scary stuff but you had to do it eventually or be forever trapped on the side of the road.

In the 15 days we were in Vietnam we only saw three traffic accidents – one a serious head on collision between two scooters (one was passing a truck), one scooter versus rear end of truck and one scooter that pulled out unexpectedly and was knocked down by a car. The latter scooter rider checked it was OK and just got back on and rode away leaving the car driver ranting for a short time before he also drive away – no names exchanged it was just part of the cost using a vehicle in Hanoi.



The French Quarter is a teeming mass of humanity with unbelievable number of businesses operating out of small shop front premises. Land is owned by the Government and people pay a land fee based on the width of the property so almost all buildings are very narrow and very tall – some are up to five storeys with a business downstairs and living quarters above.

Businesses seem to cluster together so one can find yourself on streets specialising in particular goods - locks and door handles, metal fabrication, Xmas decorations, toys, bags, clothing and even underclothing.

The other members of the group arrived over the next few days and we felt like old hands passing on advice we had been given about the technique for crossing the road, best place to exchange currency for the Vietnamese Dong (16,000 to the AUD\$) etc.

On the first day we were collected and taken for a briefing, to select our bikes and demonstrate to the ride leader that we could ride on loose surfaces without falling off.

The bikes were mostly Honda 150cc road trail bikes that turned out to be the perfect choice as they were easy to handle in the gnarly off road tracks and still had enough power to "Safely" (I will come to that later) pass vehicles such as trucks, buses, cars etc.

Day 1 Hanoi to Mai Chau

We were bussed 20 km out of Hanoi and picked up our bikes as it was obviously too dangerous for novices to attempt to make our way through Hanoi traffic. To survive on the roads you had to forget the majority of road safety rules etc. and just go for it the same way everyone else does.

The first 10km or so to the fuel stop was somewhat terrifying with all manner of vehicles on the road. Vietnamese traffic travels on the RHS (to us wrong side) of the road. You very quickly learnt to interpret and understand the meaning of bike, bus, car, motorcycle and truck horns – these are used to inform other people on the road of the driver's intention. A quick toot-toot as you come up behind another vehicle means that I am going to pass so hold your line. Vehicles behind you do the same so you do not make any radical variation to your travel line because you can be passed mostly on your LHS but two wheelers might pass you on either side.

You know what – the system works!

After the fuel stop we settled into what is a high speed ride in Vietnam – sometimes reaching 90kph as the bikes did not have much more in them.

At first morning tea stop Paul Turner did an excellent imitation of a turtle by falling off his bike and lying on his back with arms and legs in the air.



In later days one of our group did reach 110kph downhill with a tailwind.

Ended the day at a homestay in Mai Chau though some of us opted for a nearby hotel for a bit more privacy.

Dinner was followed by entertainment by local dancers and ended up with "talking water" which is a local home brew made from rice.

Day 2 Mai Chau to Phu Yen

Back on the road and then off onto tracks, through rice paddies with the trails at times no wider than a goat track. Good practice for what was to come in later days.

The villages we passed through highlighted the tough rural lifestyle and almost abject poverty in which some people lived. Houses were little more than shacks with dirt floors and gaps between wall boards.

In spite of all of this the people still came out to see the crazy white people riding through their villages – smiling and watching us like we were the best entertainment they had seen for a while.

Climbed into the mountains and rode into low cloud that obscured vision to the point that you just had to follow the taillights of the vehicle in front and hope for the best- Scary stuff and not something I wanted to repeat.



Navigating traffic on the roads does not mean just watching out for vehicles of all types but also people, chicken, ducks, dogs, cats, cows, buffalo and anything else that can move.

You may come around a corner and find a dog that has decided to have a sleep in the middle of the road, or a duck crossing the road with a trail of ducklings, pigs with piglets etc. it was never ending so you had to keep your wits about you.

Motorbikes were carrying all sorts of items including pigs, chickens and ducks in baskets with the show stopper being a full sized live cow trussed and lashed on its side to an oversized carry rack on a 110cc scooter.

The responsibility is on everyone to avoid everyone else.

We ended the day at a hotel in Phu Yen, with most of us opting for an early night as we were worn out from the day's riding and concentration. Great fun.

This is not a town that sees many tourists so we were a curiosity to the locals yet they were still smiling and friendly as a bunch of motorcycles rode into town.

What a sight we were – covered in dust and dirt with mud spattered boots and pants – ambassadors for clean Aussies!

Fremantle Branch Ride Leader Steve Zaretzky 2017 Ulysses AGM Trek Port Macquarie and Return

Departs Perth Saturday 6 May 2017

Arrives Port Macquarie Sunday 14 May 2017

- Week 1: Overall seven days riding plus two days leisure probably Ceduna or Streaky Bay.
- Week 2: Have a week of your own time or volunteer to help with AGM setting up.
- Week 3: AGM Week. Plenty of Rides and Socialising.
- Week 4: Overall seven days of riding plus one leisure day getting back to Perth.

Return Date Sunday 4 June 2017

WANTED - 2x Support Vehicle Driver/s (Beer wagon drivers/cooks) (May be rider interchange)

I am happy to provide a vehicle for the return trip but it will need a driver or two. Here is WHY:

- A Pint of Beer will cost about \$11.00.
- If 6 people have three pints each every night then the cost of beer alone will be around \$3400.
- If we have a support vehicle we can drink 6 cans each per night at @\$2 / can for \$1200.

This unbudgeted cost saving alone will pay for the support vehicle. The savings are even greater if we factor in the support vehicle carrying our tents / stretchers and other cooking gear and food supplies. We can also reduce our riding distances by cutting out our leisure days.

8 days riding @ 525km / day

9 days riding @ 460km / day

With support vehicle and sleeping in Tents on cots we have greater control over where we stop for overnight camps. We can eat reasonably healthy and fresh food and can have hot coffee, cold beer or cheap red at our own price.

Provide own tent and cot (assume currently owned) \$0 (also reduces AGM accom cost)
The occasional Caravan park fee (Return) \$400

Add 6 cans of beer per person per night @\$2 can - \$200 (\$1715 each total)

The savings increase exponentially if Red Wine is consumed.

The support vehicle driver's share of cost is approx. \$765

How it works. Each person deposits \$800 (rounded for contingency) into a specified credit / debit card account. Two cards are issued. All costs associated with Support vehicle (including wear and tear costs like blown tyres), with food and caravan parks / camping are to be drawn against the card balance.

Unsupported costs as follows

Accommodation (to Port Macquarie) – Budget about \$120 per night for a double bed or twin share in Motel style.

Food – if you carry your own brekky cereal and stove for coffee

Lunch as a burger or similar about \$15

Tea - a pub meal or roadhouse about \$20 - \$30 per night depending on choice. Obviously if you have a stove you can cook / reheat your own food a lot cheaper

- Fuel I think the most expensive fuel I paid for was \$1.68 per litre. A big cruiser doing 14.25km/ltr would use about 600 litres, return. Average that at \$1.40 /ltr and you will need to allow \$850 for fuel for the return trip. Average ride day is 600km.
- AGM Accommodation best on offer is a Tent City Tent on site at Port Macquaire. Each tent has two camp stretchers / cots and full rubber floor and usually a 12v light and two chairs. See AGM Registration. If you volunteer for a few days starting the Monday 15th May you will usually be allowed to camp for free (to be confirmed) at the AGM site in set up week.

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

Lighten Up!

A look at the latest developments in sub 350 cc motorcycles

As the motorcycle industry continues to change, two things are abundantly clear:

- 1. Dual sport/ADV motorcycles are here to stay, and
- 2. Riders are demanding lighter-weight, lower-power alternatives to heftier 650 cc + machines.

So how have manufacturers responded? Well, for the last couple of years, really, they haven't outside the sport bike category.

To be sure, sales of established models like the Yamaha WR250R and the more tractor-like Suzuki DRZ400 have been steady, but many consumers still find themselves in want of a hybrid motorcycle that does not yet exist.

Perhaps this is a mythical 400-500 cc, fuel injected, 350 lb. motorcycle that can carry you down the highway at 75 mph while being light enough to pick up when dropped on single track. Or maybe it's one of the handful of new lightweight motorcycles that 2017 has in store.



Lighter but Better? - BMW 310 GS

Perhaps the most anticipated of all the new lightweight revelations is BMW's 374 lb. (estimated) GS. Sporting a 19-inch front wheel, 34 HP single cylinder engine and 6 speed transmission, it's easy to see why this new machine has so many people talking. With that said, it seems that BMW is pushing this more as a commuter, with occasional trips on dirt roads, as opposed to a more dirt worthy adventure tourer ala the DRZ 400. So, while the new 310GS will be unquestionably easier to handle for new riders, will it find a home in many experienced riders' garages?

Cross Trained - Kawasaki Versys-X 300



A motorcycle that holds a lot of promise, the new 300 Kawasaki Versys is a lightweight tourer with all terrain potential. Borrowing the Ninja 300's, 296 cc V-twin engine, riders can look forward to smooth cruising speeds up to 70 miles per hour on the highway, while with the appropriate tires, tackling dirt rides that stop just short of the "gnarly stuff." With a nice wind screen, upright seat position, great styling and whopping 4.5-gallon fuel tank, the new Versys is likely to have many takers.

Trail Runner - Honda CRF250L Rally



Though there is an abundance of small displacement dual sports on the market, Honda is the first to step up to the plate in an effort to make one a "stock" adventure tourer. Ok, so you'll still need to do a little work on it to start roaming the country, but with an adjustable windscreen, 70+ mpg and fuel injection, it certainly represents a step in the right direction. Established off-road performance, additional "rally inspired" fairings for enhanced weather protection and it looks like Honda has itself a pretty good 320-pound motorcycle.

In Theory - Suzuki V-Strom 250




While Suzuki has not officially committed to adding a 250 cc version to the respected V-Strom line-up, they have gone so far as to showcase the concept at this year's EICMA. Appearing to be something of a city commuter/grocery getter, with built-in luggage and 17 inch wheels, one wonders if this wouldn't be more suited toward the European or Asian continents, where motorcycles often play a more practical daily role. Of course, if the price is right, who knows? Maybe they could find a home here in the U. S, ... in theory.

As the smaller displacement segment continues to evolve, it will be interesting to see how consumers react to the influx of new models. Are manufacturers reading the trends correctly and producing the right types of motorcycles? In 2017 we'll see what the consumers think.
