

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

Eulogy for Geoff Ball Feb 8 2023

We all know that Geoff was a keen motorcyclist and an absolute stalwart of the Ulysses Club Fremantle branch for many years.

Geoff and Jill joined the Ulysses Club in 2007 and quickly aligned themselves with the Fremantle Branch. Geoff and Jill brought with them a wealth of experience and stories from their lives, particularly as coach tour operators, and often regaled us with absolutely hilarious stories about the different adventures they encountered along the way. I have so often wished I could have been on one of their tours – although I would never be sure what of Geoff's commentary would be fact, and what would be apocryphal – such as him telling us that in a certain area there are about 50 caves but only 16 of them have been discovered so far.

Geoff brought his humour into the Fremantle Branch and gave us a monthly review of rides with his regular "tales from the rear". He and Jill were frighteningly observant, which led to inciteful, incisive and hilarious descriptions exposing our various foibles and follies. No one was safe, but the stories were delivered with love and great good nature. You knew you had done something particularly gooseish if Geoff awarded you MUG of the month with a full description of your stuff up!

Geoff and Jill were the 'heads and tails' king and queen at each monthly meeting. This was done with great flourish and style, with Jill being a superb barrel girl - always a kiss for the winner and there would be some clever comment from Geoff.

Their big role was to be Tail End Charlie (TEC) at EVERY Sunday ride. This was no sinecure role - come rain, hail or shine, 'rounding up the chickens' who would so often get in a muddle trying to follow that week's ride leader, was not an easy task, but did provide plenty of fodder for 'tails from the rear'. The TEC role also meant being the main mopper-upper of issues, breakdowns, and 'offs'. We know we felt that bit safer with Geoff and Jill behind us complete with competence, care, and a first aid kit.

Geoff and Jill were the first to put their hands up for any volunteering - whether corner marking for cancer research fundraisers, participating at gear sales for the RFDS, helping at events, or a host of other activities. Always reliable, always with a smile AND continuing for as long as Geoff was able.

Weekends away were not complete without Geoff and Jill. Evenings would devolve into fits of laughter thanks to Geoff. When those pewter wine goblets came out, we knew it was 'game on'.

In 2013, the value of Geoff and Jill was recognised when they were nominated and subsequently awarded, the Telemachus Medal for their contribution to the Fremantle Branch. The award is named after the son of Odysseus and Penelope, and a central character in Homer's Odyssey from which we get the club name of "Ulysses". (Yes - we are classical scholars in Ulysses...!). The Telemachus Medal is a significant award and nominations are subject to very close scrutiny by the National Committee (NATCOM). To be nominated is an honour, to be awarded is something very special and rare. There are only a handful that have been presented in WA. Geoff and Jill were such deserving recipients.

There are so many stories that pre-date my time with the club, but I am so honoured to have had the privilege of knowing Geoff, and being able to call Geoff and Jill my friends.

I and my fellow Ulyssians have frequently laughed until our faces hurt thanks to Geoff. He embraced the club motto of 'grow old disgracefully' and enriched our lives in so many ways. My goodness - we will miss him.

Ride on Geoff. May there be no more wet roads or gravel - just sunshine, scenery, and twisty roads.

MAGNAT DEBON 1935 VMA 748CC 2 CYL



Magnat-Debon 1935 'VMA' 748cc side valve v-twin

In the year 1900 Joseph Magnat and Louis Debon founded a firm in Grenoble that started to produce bicycles. In 1902 the first motorcycle was produced, equipped with a De Dion Bouton engine. In the years before the first world war the firm prospered: the machines had many novel features such as telescopic front suspension and overhead valves. Both founders died at the end of the war and in the early twenties the company got into financial problems. In 1922 the firm was taken over by the Terrot company. For a number of years the machines of Terrot and Magnat-Debon kept their own identities: the Magnat-Debons were mostly equipped with English Blackburne engines while some of the the Terrots had JAPs. In this way separate agencies could be kept and in the market the two makes operated as separate companies.

From 1929 on the machines were practically identical, including the side valve power source of Terrot's own manufacture. In the mid-thirties the Magnat-Debon range comprised some 16 models, ranging from a humble 100cc "Vélomoteur" priced at 1425 Francs, to a luxurious 748cc heavy tourer V-twin which was about five times as expensive.

Both makes survived the depression, finally ceasing production in the early '60s. The top-of-the-range V-twin was designated VMA, and was virtually identical to the Terrot VA. There were a number of detail differences though, a notable was the different headlight. The 50 degree unit-construction side valve engine had bore x stroke dimensions of 70x97mm and comprised a four-speed, hand-change gearbox. Ignition was by battery and coil. The VMA was a compact and extremely good-looking, large-capacity range-leader. The model was aimed at a wealthy and enthusiastic clientele who preferred to motor-cycle rather than drive a car. The V-twins were produced from 1934 till 1939 and a number of Terrot VAs saw military service. The twins were sold in very modest numbers to the general public and it is believed that no more than 10 have survived, most of them being Terrots.

This example has received a high-quality restoration to the original specification in black, red and chrome, retaining such period-correct items as the metal toolboxes and the distinctively-badged cast aluminium silencer. The design of the petrol tank and silencer, together with the gracefully curved rear mudguard clearly show an Art Deco touch. Some of the interesting details are the illuminated number plate, the built-in Jaeger speedo, the aluminium primary chain case and footboards and the French Terry saddle. This very rare and well-finished machine is a good runner and comes with maintenance manual and current registration.
