



FUN FACTS EVERY MOTORCYCLIST SHOULD KNOW

Fun Fact 1: The First Motorcycle Was Made of WOOD!

While many speculate over which 2-wheeled machine of the 19th century was the first "true" motorcycle, most consider the "Reitwagen" ("Riding Car") of 1885 to be the origin of modern motorcycles. Made by German inventors Gottlieb Daimler and Wilhelm Maybach, this single-cylinder primitive bike is considered one of the world's first petroleum-powered transportation devices. Essentially a motorized bicycle with the pedals removed, the Reitwagen not only uses a wooden frame, but also wooden forks and wheels as well!

Fun Fact 2: Diesel Motorcycles Exist

This fun fact might be more of a painful one for petrol purists, but it's true! The Royal Enfield Taurus is one example of a commercially produced diesel-powered motorcycle. Weighing in at 432lbs with a top speed of 65km/h, the Taurus might not be built for performance, yet the impressive mileage capacity, strong power to weight ration, rugged durability, and widely loved oddity of this 90's motorcycle has given it a cult-like following among enthusiasts and collectors.

Fun Fact 3. The Best-Selling Motorcycle Ever is NOT What You'd Expect...

Admittedly we're wading into controversial waters here, but this fun motorcycle fact is actually arguably a scooter one. Clocking in at a respectable cc range of 49-125, the Honda Super Cub (or Honda Cub) is a worldwide favorite that has been in *non-stop production since 1958*. Celebrating an astonishing 100 million units produced in 2018, the iconic Honda model isn't just the best-selling motorcycle/scooter ever, it's the best-selling *vehicle* of all time!

Fun Fact 4. The Harley "Hog" Came from Racing

Most riders around the world are familiar with the iconic Harley-Davidson term "hog" when referring to a motorcycle. However few riders know that this name actually came from Harley's 1900's racing team, the "Wrecking Crew." The team allegedly had a small pig as a mascot, which one of the riders would place on the tank of their bike whenever it came time to do a victory lap. Legend has it that this is why the motorcycles themselves became known as "hogs" over time. In 1983, the "Harley Owners Group" or "HOG" was officially founded.

Fun Fact 5. Yamaha's Musical Beginnings

Sweet muffler music isn't the only thing this brand giant makes, Yamaha, one of the best-known motorcycle and scooter producers in the world initially began as a piano manufacturer in 1887. However, the switch from music to motorcycles makes more sense than you might think when you look at who, and when, the company was making this pivotal shift...

In 1955, after WWII the company's then-president Genichi Kawakami believed that in order to rebuild the country needed transportation more than pianos. Thus, Yamaha's first motorcycle was created — the 125cc YA-1. Today Yamaha produces everything from motorcycles two swimming pools and wheelchairs (and still, high-quality pianos!).



MÜNCH 1983 TTS-E TURBO 1200CC 4 CYL OHC 3111



Münch 1983 TTS-E Turbo 1200cc NSU OHC four cylinder

Friedel Münch began his career in the late 1940s as an independent tuner and inveterate modifier of motorcycles. His first notable work was on a Horex in 1948, which had such good performance the factory offered him a job in their competition department. He had no desire to work for someone else, and refused their offer, but later relented due to financial difficulties, a consistent theme in his business life.

After Horex went bankrupt in 1960, Münch bought their tooling, and made spares and built Horex specials (such as the tasty cafe racer above). In the quest for more speed, he created a 'relatively' light racing motorcycle using the NSU ohc four cylinder engine, weighing in at around 220km total, and giving good performance. The frame was based on a Norton Featherbed, as were all his subsequent chassis. The first proper 'Mammut' (Mammoth) was built in 1966, with 996cc and 55hp, which gave good performance for the day at 185 km or so. It used a very large (250mm) magnesium front drum brake which Munch had originally developed for racing Nortons. The new machine was a sensation for its speed and impressive scale.

Everywhere your eyes fall on a Münch, you see components designed without regard to cost. Friedel Münch was an indefatigable one-man design team, not hemmed in by norms in his pursuit of weight savings, power or speed. Münch' metal of choice for his castings was electron, a magnesium-alloy lighter than aluminium, though harder to work with. Besides various covers and cases, he used electron for the one-piece seat base/rear mudguard, the double-leading-shoe front brake of his own design and the vaned rear wheel, also his own design and the first cast motorcycle rim to make production. As production continued into the Seventies, in effect every machine was a special order, no two alike.

Münch, always struggling financially and casting about for backers, eventually sold his own name in association with his motorcycles to businessman Heinz Henke, who intended to series produce 'Münch' bikes (only a few were built, perhaps only 4). Friedel maintained 'Mammut', and shortly began producing models under this name in limited numbers for collectors.

Every machine from the first was bespoke around a similar core, although the state of tune, shape of tanks, seat, mudguards, handlebars, headlamps, colour, etc, were all optional. Each machine was hand-built by Friedel Münch and his employees, and his legend grew for his unique and mighty machines. Less than 500 were ultimately built.

Dutchman and Mammut enthousiast Erik Meesters has written the fascinating book "Mit Herz & Seele, die Geschichte von Friedel Münch und Helmut Fath" which gives detailed information on Münch' career and the bikes he designed and built. On page 309 of this book the specimen we offer is pictured, with the remark that this machine, with frame # 436, took three years to complete and was the last Turbo that was built. Incidentally, only seven of these Turbo machines saw the light of day... The odometer on this pristine mighty mammoth shows only 11,500 km.
